Dear Members,

I enjoyed all three meetings in 2016, and I will be at the meeting on St. Simons Island, GA (April 21 to 23). You can find more information on SE Regional news here. Recently, at a local haiku gathering, there was discussion about kigo. I wonder how we can evoke empathy with a reader if he/she lives in a different climate, or has a dissimilar cultural background. When I write haiku, whether in English or Japanese, I rely on a Japanese saijki. I use 'asparagus' or 'clam' as a spring kigo because the saijiki says so. Honestly, I am not sure why the saijiki lists kigo such as 'seaweed' in the spring, but I decided that I would not question its authority. You would not ask why three strikes eliminates a batter when you play baseball, right?

In the above haiku, it is easier to feel 'spring' because I can imagine the calmness of the spring sea. This may allude to Buson's '春の海ひねもすのた りのたりかな'(haru no umi/hinemosu/notari notari/kana) (spring ocean/gently and slowly/all day).

Since I am not a nature person, I often search the Internet to learn about a bird or a flower in someone's haiku. Though not everyone will know that 'seaweed' is a Japanese spring kigo, I will use it anyway because I rely on the saijiki. If a haiku can open a door for a reader and let him/her feel empathy, I say that haiku is successful.

Dear Members,

The HSA ended 2016 in solid financial condition thanks to a steady level of membership, many more of whom renewed before January 1, and thanks to the continued generosity of donors.



Cash in Bank as of 12/31/16 was \$88,042.

Income was higher than expenses by \$8,825.

Income was higher than budget by nearly \$2,000, mostly in Dues/Contributions. Many more people are paying online and earlier through the <u>HSA</u> <u>website</u>.

We also received an unexpected \$1,000 grant thanks to the efforts of Regional Coordinator Shelley Baker-Gard.

The conversion of HSA contests to electronic entries and payment was a big success, and contest fee income exceeded budget by \$492.

Expenses were under budget by \$6,010, most notably Travel reimbursements (\$4,400 under) and Frogpond costs (\$2,573 under, due to smaller journals last year).

HSA supported Haiku North America in 2016 with a donation of \$1,000 for the 2017. In addition, a number of smaller grants totaling \$1,528 were given out to support haiku programs.

Winners and Runners Up will be invited to attend the LibrAsia2017 Plenary Day as audience members, which will include entry to the award ceremony and haiku reading, as well as to the haiku workshop, run by Emiko Miyashita and Hana Fujimoto of the Haiku International Association. Winners will be published in the prestigious IAFOR Haiku Anthology.

In addition, this year's Guest Judge, award-winning poet Susan Burch, will make a special selection on the theme of "history, story, narrative."

The Robert Spiess Memorial Haiku Awards for 2017

Modern Haiku is pleased to announce the Robert Spiess Memorial Haiku Awards Competition for 2017. The purpose of this competition is to honor the life and work of Bob Spiess, editor of *Modern Haiku* from 1978 to his death on March 13, 2002.

Email entries are accepted as well as postal entries.

Theme: Haiku are to be written in the spirit of the

following 'Speculation' (Robert Spiess, A Year's Speculations on Haiku, Modern Haiku Press, 1995):

When haiku poets are truly stirred by a now-moment of awareness they respond with a simple, usually silent "Yes," not because they "understand," for that means the intellect is operating on the event-experience. This "Yes" is not one of considered approval but is prior to such an intellective judgment, it is an unqualified acceptance of the moment and its entities just as they are in their true nature at that particular and never to be repeated split second.

Deadline: In hand no later than March 13, 2017.

Rules: The competition is open to everyone but the staff of *Modern Haiku*, the competition coordinator, and the judge. Entries must be in English. Each entry must be the original, unpublished work of the author, and should not be under consideration in a contest or for publication elsewhere. For purposes of this competition, appearance of a haiku in an Internet journal, on a Web site, in a blog, or in any other public media is considered publication, but posting haiku on a private email list is not. Of course, entries should not be shared in an Internet journal, Web site, blog, private or public email list, or any other public media during the term of the competition.

Submission guidelines: Poets may submit a maximum of five haiku written in the spirit of the above Speculation, accompanied by the applicable entry fee.

Postal entries should be typed or printed legibly on one sheet paper. The poet's name, mailing address, telephone number, and email address (if any) should appear in the upper left-hand corner above the haiku. Send postal entries to: Billie Wilson, 1170 Fritz Cove Road, Juneau, AK 99801-8501 USA.

Email entries are to be submitted as follows: (1) on the *Modern Haiku* <u>subscription page</u>, scroll down to the Donate button; (2) make a donation of up to \$5 [\$1 for each entry]; (3) when you receive your payment confirmation number, copy and paste it into an email with your haiku and your name, mailing address, telephone number, and email address; (4) send the email to Billie Wilson at <u>akwilsons@gci.net</u>.

Please keep a copy of your submission; entries will not be returned. Please follow the instructions carefully: entries that are incomplete or that do not comply with the instructions will be discarded.

Entry fee: \$1 per haiku, cash, check, or PayPal (U.S. funds); make checks payable to *Modern Haiku*; for email entries, follow the instructions above.

Adjudication: A judge will be selected by *Modern Haiku*; the judge's name will be announced at the time of the awards. Judging will be double-blind, and the judge will not know the identity of the entrants. The judge's decisions are final.

Selection criteria: The judge will look for entries that hew to Western norms for haiku as published in *Modern Haiku* and other leading English-language haiku journals and that best capture the spirit of the theme Speculation above. There are no rules as to syllable or line count.

Awards: First Prize: \$100 plus a signed copy of *The Turtle's Ears* (1971, out of print). Second Prize: \$50 plus a copy of Bob's *Some Sticks and Pebbles* (2001, out of print); Third Prize: \$25 plus a copy of Bob's *Five Caribbean Haibun* (1972, out of print). Up to five poets will be awarded Honorable Mentions and each will receive a copy of Bob's *A Year's Speculations on Haiku* (1995).

Notification: Winners will be notified by email or phone before the general announcement. Winning entries will be published in the summer 2017 issue of *Modern Haiku* and posted on the *Modern Haiku* Web site, on or before July 1, 2017. If you would like a list of the winners, please indicate that on your e-mail entries or send a stamped, self-addressed envelope (SASE) with your postal entries. The winners will be announced when the summer issue of *Modern Haiku* is released.

Southern California Haiku Study Group

December Workshop

On December 17, 2016, twelve members of the Southern California Haiku Study Group met at the Lamanda Park Library in Pasadena for a haibun workshop led by Greg Longenecker. The meeting kicked off with a read-around of haiku by Lynn Allgood, Joyce Futa, Kimberly Esser, Deborah P Kolodji, Kirk Kolodji, Elva Lauter, Greg Longenecker, Toni Steele, Pat Wakimoto, Kathabela Wilson, James Won, and Sharon Yee.

The following books were brought to share during the read-around:

Old Enough by Bruce H. Feingold Lit from Within by Ruth Yarrow Full of Moonlight (HSA 2016 Anthology) Naad Anunaad (Haiku Anthology from India) Cherry Blossom Light (Yuki Teikei Haiku Society 2016 Anthology) Answers by Edward J. Rielly The Deep End of the Sky by Chad Lee Robinson

After the haiku sharing, Greg talked about his experience as one of the judges of the HSA haibun contest with Joan Zimmerman. He then led a discussion about the three elements of a haibun: the title, the prose, and the haiku. A handout was given to participants with several haibun separated out to a list of titles, a list of prose pieces, and a list of haiku. Participants were given time to try to match the titles with the prose and haiku. A discussion ensued regarding various choices participants made as compared to the actual haibun these parts came from. It was a discussion that would resonate with participants long after the workshop ended.

Post-Holiday Party

On January 8, 2017, the traditional Southern California Haiku Study Group post-holiday party was held at the Temple City home of Deborah P Kolodji. Due to an unusual break in cold rainy weather, with blue skies and 70 degrees, the party took place in the backyard patio, featuring potluck dishes brought by members, supplemented by food from Portos Cuban Bakery. January Workshop

On a day when 750,000 people in Los Angeles were marching, we held a quiet haiku workshop in the Lamanda Park Library on January 21st. The topic of the workshop was how to write effective haiku about current events.

As is our custom, we opened the workshop with a read-around of haiku from participants, which included Lynn Allgood, Marcia Behar, Kim Esser, Bill Hart, D'Ellen Hutchins, Deborah P Kolodji, Greg Longenecker, Patty, Ralph, Beki Reese, Kathabela Wilson, James Won, and Wendy Wright.

The following books and journals were brought to share during the haiku read-around:

Frogpond 39.3, Autumn 2016 Lit from Within by Ruth Yarrow The Haiku Anthology, 3rd Edition, by Cor van den Heuvel Acorn #37, Fall 2016 Street Chatter Fading by Abigail Friedman I Wait for the Moon by Momoko Kuroda (tr. Abigail Friedman)

A copy of the essay. "World Economy in Word

Economy" by Ruth Yarrow from *Frogpond* 34.1, 2011 was shared with participants, who took turns reading the sample haiku about the economy aloud. A handout by Deborah P Kolodji called "Engaging the Senses vs Making a Statement" was passed around. This handout had "5-7-5" political statement "haiku" from various newspapers. The object of the exercise was to try to write haiku on these topics which engaged the senses versus making a statement. For example, the Marin Independent Journal recently published election "haiku" from readers. As often happens in these newspaper features, most of these poems, if not all of them, were not haiku, they were statements.

One example:

I go to the polls. I vote none of the above. They win anyway. - Richard Park, Tiburon

Participants were not to "rewrite" the haiku or otherwise plagiarize it; instead, they were to use the topics presented as prompts to write haiku or senryu. The following example was provided:

his name on the ballot the black blots of my votes - Deborah P Kolodji

Other sample haiku addressed the death of John Glenn and California Propositions on the November ballot (plastic bag ban, bonds for large projects) written as 5-7-5. For those participants who needed a reprieve from politics, the following kigo were offered as prompts: rainy season, bare root roses, bare branches, toyon berries, Orion, long nights, winter sparrow, tangerines, bare fields, snowcapped mountains, overwintering monarchs, and migrating whales.

After a productive writing sessions which produced poems ranging from plastic bag bans to winter sparrows, we held an anonymous haiku workshop on the baiku and senzul we had written

Yukei Teikei Haiku Society

The Yuki Teikei Haiku Society's 2016 Retreat Amy Ostenso-Kennedy

This year's annual retreat was held from November 10 through 13 at the Asilomar State Beach and Conference Center in Pacific Grove, California. The theme for this year's retreat was the "Role of Kigo and Season Words in Haiku" and the special guest speaker was Charles Trumbull.

Thursday: For those who could attend, the conference began with an afternoon ginko walk led by YTHS President Patrick Gallagher at Point Lobos State Park. The evening program opened with a Welcome by President Patrick Gallagher and an Introduction to the Conference by Program Chair, Betty Arnold. This was followed by Patricia Machmiller's Memorial for Jane Reichhold (1937-2016), who was a great friend to the world of haiku and to the Yuki Teikei Haiku Society, serving as the editor of society's newsletter GEPPO from 1991 to 1993. We are all greatly saddened by her passing. The new publication Old Pond: The Art of Haiku was presented by its editor, Clysta Seeney. With essays and articles on the craft of haiku by Jerry Ball, Alex Benedict, Alice Benedict, Margaret Chula, Carol Conti-Entin, Helen Davie, D. Claire Gallagher, Christopher Herold, Jim Kacian, Patricia J. Machmiller, H.F. (Tom) Noves, Francine Porad, Jane Reichhold, Ebba Story, Michael Dylan Welch, and Paul O. WIlliams, this collection contains wisdom and guidance for all writers of haiku.

Next, featured guest speaker Charles Trumbull spoke about the Haiku Database Project. Trumbull began this database project in September 1998 with the intention of creating a tool to make the location and study of haiku easier for scholars and serious students. The database contains haiku in English, as well as translations of poems from Japanese and a number of other languages. The text of the haiku as well as information about each poem can be accessed by means of a number of searchable categories, including author, composition or publication date, kigo, season word, keywords, etc. As of November 2016, the database contains over 342,000 haiku. Although the database is not publicly available, everyone is encouraged to contact Charles Trumbull directly with search requests. The evening ended with the opening by Patricia Machmiller of the Silent Auction, which serves as a fundraiser for scholarships to the retreat.

Friday: The morning session began with a talk by Michael Sheffield on the Historical Perspective of Kigo. This was followed by featured speaker Charles Trumbull's presentation "Shiki's Kigo," in which he shared his recent research on the haiku of Matsuoka Shiki in connection with an ongoing exploration of the question of seasonality in haiku. Trumbull's talk included discussion of kigo as it is and has been used traditionally in Japanese haiku followed by an analysis of how Shiki used kigo in his own work, aided by research with the Haiku Database.

Trumbull finished his talk with a discussion of kigo by those who came after Shiki. The morning session concluded with a Panel Discussion, in which Charles Trumbull, Patricia Machmiller, Patrick Gallagher, and Michael Sheffield shared their views with the group on Kigo and Season Words in Haiku. In the afternoon, Charles Trumbull and Michael Sheffield held readings of their work and the Silent Auction closed. After dinner, the group was treated to a stunning multimedia display of YTHS members' haiga, coordinated by the Haiga Committee, and Elaine Whitman, aided by Neil Whitman, shared her delightful scarf haiga. This was followed by the presentation of the 2016 Membership Anthology Cherry Blossom Light, by Mimi Ahern (editor), David Sherertz (designer), and Carolyn Fitz (artist), which included a moving tribute to the society's leader and dojin Patricia J. Machmiller.

Next, Contest Chair Greg Longenecker announced

the winners of the 2016 Kiyoshi & Kiyoko Tokutomi Haiku Contest. This annual contest, which honors the founders of YTHS, accepts submissions of traditional haiku with a five-seven-five structure and one kigo. This year's contest judge was haiku poet, literary critic, and translator Marie Mariya. First prize was awarded to Priscilla Lignori, second prize to Ferris Gilli, and third prize to Marilyn Ashbaugh. A number of other YTHS members received honorable mentions.

Saturday: In the morning, participants had the opportunity to express themselves visually in the Art Studio and take part in a Haiga Educational Workshop. The afternoon session included a Participant's' Haiku Workshop and a Kukai, both led by Patrick Gallagher. And Saturday evening featured the Renku Party, which continued late into the night.

Sunday: The conference ended on Sunday morning with a reading of the renku from the previous evening by the verses' authors. The group then shared their haiku and artwork from the conference, and everyone took part in the Closing Acknowledgments to sum up the retreat and express their appreciation for the presenters, organizers, and participants.
